### Middle Township High School Mock Trial Team wins **Cape May County championship**

The Middle Township High School (MTHS) Mock Trial Team defeated Lower Cape May Regional High School's team during the recent championship competition held at the Cape May County Superior Court, becoming the Cape May County champions.

Teams at the championship competition were scored based on witness testimony, ability to answer questions on cross-examination, and ability to develop and be in character. Also, attorneys were judged on their direct and cross examination questions, opening and closing statements, and using legal objections and arguments throughout the trial based on the Mock Trial Rules of Evidence.

The MTHS mock trial team, consisting of 11 students ranging from freshmen to seniors, have practiced daily since receiving their case in October ensuring they were prepared for the competitions that began in January. This year, the students received a criminal case alleging fraud in college admissions.

After earning the title, the MTHS



students competed in the regional competition held in New Brunswick. At the competition, the Cape May County champions defeated the Cumberland County champions in round one and then faced Mainland Regional High School, the Atlantic County champions. Although Mainland Regional High School was declared the winner, the MTHS team had an amazing season.

Robinson recently earned the DAISY Award for Extraordinary Nurses from a nationwide program that recognizes registered nurses who exemplify outstanding compassion, courage and integrity. She received the award for initiating the Critical Care Pain Observance Tool, which helps determine a patient's pain level when they are unable to report it themselves. This tool assists nurses in effectively managing their patients' pain treatments.

As part of the board-certified team at Beaufort Memorial Heart Specialists, Taylor works with cardiologists to help patients with cardiovascular diseases and conditions. Her areas of expertise include heart failure, heart catheterization care, atrial fibrillation, hypertension and lifestyle modification.

After graduating from MTHS in 2006, Robinson attended Washington College and earned a Bachelor of Science in Biology in 2010. She then studied to receive a Bachelor of Science in Nursing from Drexel University in 2011 and a Master of Science in Nursing from the University of South Carolina.

When not working, Robinson spends time with her husband, Adam Kajfez, and their dog, Cooper. Together they explore national parks, hike and kayak.



### Middle Township High School welcomes Gavin Liepe as head football coach



Middle Township High School introduced Gavin Liepe as the new head football coach at the start of the winter athletic season. Liepe, 25, is a physical education teacher at Middle Township Middle School and has extensive experience in the sport.

Liepe, an Atlantic County native, was recognized as an outstanding football player while attending Holy Spirit High School, earning First Team All-Conference and First Team All-Press of AC honors. After graduating high school in 2017, Liepe played four seasons of college football, one at Christopher Newport University and three at The College of New Jersey (TCNJ). At TCNJ, Liepe was a two-time All-NJAC outside linebacker, leading the Lions in tackles for two seasons.

He then gained professional experience by playing two seasons in the German Football League, one with the Kirchdorf Wildcats and one with the Frankfurt Universe.

Liepe is replacing Frank Riggitano, who recently retired after working for 36 years with MTHS. For 22 of these years, he was the head football coach and Cape May County's alltime leader in high school head football coaching victories.

### Middle Township HS Athletics Season Highlights

Middle Township High School wrapped up another championship winter sports season with a featured highlight in girls basketball. The season came to a close just after the team claimed its second consecutive New Jersey State Interscholastic Athletic Association (NJSIAA) Group 2 South Jersey Championship. The girls finished with a 23-9 record with seniors Hannah Cappelletti, Iyanna Bennett, Gabriella Cruz, and Madison Palek leading the way. The future is bright for this group as several players from this year's championship team will return for next season.









### **Athletics Season Highlights Continued**

In boys basketball, the team captured the school's secondever Cape-Atlantic League (CAL) Championship before falling to the eventual state champion in the NJSIAA Group 2 South Jersey Championship game. The boys were led by seniors Anthony Trombetta, Bubba McNeil, Michael Zarfati, and Re'ale Basquine. Not only was this season one for the books for the entire team, but brothers Bubba and Jamir McNeil also both reached their 1,000-career point marks.







On the mats, the **Panthers** wrestling team won the firstever playoff match in school history with a thrilling 32-30 win over defending group champion Haddonfield. The team ended the season with an 18-7 record, which included a second place finish during the prestigious Buc Classic at Red Bank Regional High School. Maurice Matthews, Shaun Watkins, Dontae Kelly, Max Adelizzi, and Tyler King advanced to the Region 8 finals in individual competition.





Throughout the season, the **Dance**, **Cheer**, **and Pom team** was ever-present with its high-energy performances at all home basketball games and even traveled with the teams for the CAL semifinals and championship games.





In the pool, this year's **boys and girls swim teams** had a record number of participants, with more than 70 student-athletes competing. The boys swim team advanced to the NJSIAA Group C Semifinals, falling to eventual South Jersey Champion, Seneca in a last race nail-biter 86-84. Senior Brandyn Acevedo broke the school record in both the 100m backstroke and 400m freestyle events but missed the NJSIAA Meet of Champions by a mere 0.2 seconds.
